



LEARNING IDEAS: RISING WATER EXPERIMENT

- 1.Take a shallow dish and fill it with water. You want just enough to cover the bottom.
- 2.If you want, add food colouring to the water. This just makes it easier to see and is fun, so totally optional.
- 3.Place your small votive in the middle of the dish.
- 4.Light the candle, then quickly place the empty glass over the flame, touching the water. Now wait while the candle burns out.
- 5.Watch as the water rises up into the glass.



Safety

The number one safety tip here is to be careful with the flame! This experiment must be done with adult supervision at the bare minimum. With younger children, like preschoolers, this needs to be an adult-led experiment.

This STEM activity also uses glass, so it is a good idea to be careful in case it falls or breaks.
