Welcome back everyone! I hope that you all had a fantastic Easter holiday. The children have settled straight back into routine and the teachers have all been impressed with how hard everyone is working.

This week in assembly we thought about how everyone is a musician. To help explore this idea I shared the book, 'Music is for Everyone'. Listening to music is something that we want all childen to see as a pleasurable activity. Music can help calm us, get us excited and get us moving. Music is also a wonderful way to express ourselves. As a school, we are trying to help make music accessible to everyone. It would be wondeful if you could encourage your child to listen to different styles of music. Sharing some of your favourite songs is always a great discussion point! Each half term we have a different composer that we listen to. This week I introduced the musician 'Gwenno'. We listened to her song, 'A Song for Cornwall' which is sung in Cornish. In upper school the children are also learning to sing some Cornish. It is a wonderful way to explore our local heritage.

Our clerk to the governors, Jess Hutchings, has been collating the parent survey information and this will be discussed at our governors' meeting on Monday. I am delighted with the really positive results. There were also some good ideas for how we can improve things further. We will be sending out a copy of the results to parents soon. I was particularly pleased to see that 100% of parents felt their child was safe at school and 98% reported that child was happy at school. The comments about the school's strengths included:

Please encourage your child to come.












Displays


We love to celebrate the children's work through displays. Parents do not always get to see them, so we thought it would be good to share some on this week's newsletter! You might need to zoom in!
