Safeguarding/Health and Safety

Attendance

Poor attendance is seen as a possible safeguarding issue by the DfE. We do understand some absence is unavoidable, for example if your child is ill. We track every child's attendance and monitor all children who are below 95%. We monitor closely children who are below 90% because these children are classed as persistent absentees. Please do not panic if your child has been ill with chicken pox.This has probably led to them being below 90%. However, I am sure their attendance will soon rise above 90% during next half term.

We understand that pupils need to attend medical and dental appointments and that it is not always possible to arrange this outside of school time. However, we would request that any non-emergency appointments are made for outside of the school day as this keeps the disruption to a minimum and ensures that they do not miss important lessons.

Children with poorer attendance at primary school are likely to go on to continue to have poorer attendance at secondary school. Regular absences can result in poorer outcomes over time. Research shows that pupils who miss between 10% and 20% of school (which is between half and one day per week on average) stand only a 35% chance of achieving five or more good GCSEs, compared to 73% of those who miss fewer than 5% of school days.

How does occasional absence affect my child?

Missing occasional days from school may seem unimportant at the time; however, this can have a significant impact on your child in the long term:

% of attendance in a school year	Number of days absent	Weeks missed
98%	4	Less than 1 week
95%	9.5	Nearly 2 weeks
90%	19	Nearly 4 weeks
85%	28.5	Nearly 6 weeks
